Sponsored Walk



Work Experience Week

On Tuesday we attended an online program run by Move-2-Be. This was a program university encouraging girls to enter and stay in sports. They also discussed many very important and relevant issues like menstruation in sports, motivation, and confidence. This was a worthwhile course and it was amazing to see such a relevant and interesting course for teenage girls in Ireland.



On Wednesday we got to attend some virtual tours of cultural sites. We attended 3-D virtual tours of the Natural History Museum, The Louvre, and Yosemite National Park. These were really interesting tours and we all learned so much. All the tours were 3-D immersive, virtual reality, almost like we were there. We had a Google Form with questions about each site to answer so we had to hunt for different facts and pieces of information in each cultural site. We also had a lesson on how to write CVs and Cover Letters in English class. We had the opportunity to learn tips and tricks on writing CVs and had the opportunity to re-write our CVs as a class. It was a really interesting and worthwhile experience.

On Thursday we joined the "Cork International Film Festival's Intinn Youth Film and Mental Health Programme". This program took place for four hours. Over this, we watched a film based in Tallaght, Dublin surrounding the life of a young girl experiencing a wide range of difficulties in her life. After watching this film, we watched an interview with the creators and actors and another interview which broke down the significance behind the film. We learned a lot about teenager's struggles with mental health. This was a really enjoyable workshop as it gave time for discussions about what we had watched with our classmates.

On Friday we talked about Junior Achievement. The talk was about one's career path and how to achieve success in your career. We learnt all about the ways of the workplace and how to enter all areas of work. We learnt about the speaker's career path so we could see a real-life example. 
UCD Virtual Tour

The Amber Flag Committee

Well done to the Amber Flag Committee who were awarded the Pieta House Amber Flag in early May this term. The Amber Flag is awarded by Pieta House once a school has; audited the mental health provisions and identified strengths and areas of improvement, made two changes to raise awareness in the school community, held a mental health awareness day and organised fundraising for Pieta House.



Our aim:

This year we wanted to promote positive mental health in school and break the stigma that surrounds mental health issues. We wanted school to be a place where the whole school community feels they can fully express their feelings while having the comforting reminder that support services are widely available. The school acts as a community that supports each other in good and bad times.

The Committee:

The Amber flag group was led by a group of sixth year students, but each form class has their own rep whose role is to promote the positive message within their class.

What we did this year:

We revamped the rooftop garden and made it into a colorful, welcoming space. We cleaned up the space, painted it, planted some flowers in each of the House colours so it really represents every member of the school community. We included some mixed planting to represent the staff. Each sixth year student received and planted plantable bookmarks during Mental Health awareness week and these wildflower seeds are now flowering in the garden. 5th Year students sent a student questionnaire about the various supports in the school. TY students helped tidy up our outdoor spaces seeing as we are spending more time outdoors this year. The raised beds were weeded and new wildflower seeds and bulbs were planted. 3rd Years sent packages to staff in nursing homes. Each class has a rep who volunteered to represent their class and promote the aims of the group. 6th Year reps talked to the 5th Year classes about overcoming challenges

including poor motivation and low self esteem- they showed two Aware videos and followed this by group discussions. We held a photo competition every week in the dark days of Winter for each year group to send in happy/sunny photos The winning entries have been put on the app and on our new notice board. A notice board was added beside the garden to display positive messages, the winning photos and any advice/helpful services available. The 5th Years have designed a poster to go in every classroom that explains the amber flag initiative and includes some helpful tips and supports available in regards to positive mental health.



Student Council

In September at the one of our first meetings the biggest issue that we encountered was that many of the students did not like our current school tracksuit bottoms for P.E. From January to March school was online and the Student Council's goal was to make everyone feel as included as possible in school life. Everyday for two weeks the Student Council had a daily challenge for the student body. The winners won a Just Eat voucher and the challenges were a major success. We loved seeing everyones creative images and videos.

As a Student Council we knew we wanted to give back to a charity that we believed in. We chose Breast Cancer Ireland as our charity as it is has helped so many people and families all around the world. Lockdown wasn’t going to stop us supporting them so on the 12th of March the Student Council held a coffee morning with their class on a google meet where they played games and chatted. The coffee morning was a huge success as Our Lady’s raised over 1,700 euro for Breast Cancer Ireland.




The 6th Year council offered words of comfort from St. Paul, Philippians 4:6-7



