## EXTRACURRICULAR UPDATE



This term, the Green School Committee got some very exciting news as we were awarded our first ever Green Flag. This flag is awarded to schools based on the management and reduction of their litter and waste. An Tasice set out the following steps for a flag to be awarded to a school:

#### 1. Green Schools Committee

This directs the school's involvement in the programme. Ideally, the committee includes students, teachers, non-teaching staff, management and pupils.

#### 2. Environmental Review

A process of examining the school's environmental impacts in order to identify targets for action and improvement.

#### 3. Action Plan

This gives specific and achievable targets with proposed completion dates that will show real success.

#### 4. Monitoring and Evaluation

Constant monitoring of the programme ensures that progress towards targets is checked, amendments made where necessary and success celebrated.

#### 5. Curriculum Work

Curriculum materials are provided that give ideas on how to integrate environmental issues into lessons.

#### 6. Informing and Involving

A publicity programme keeps the school and wider community involved and informed through displays, assemblies and press coverage.

#### 7. Green Code

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This is a statement of the school's commitment to environmental good habits. Our Green School Committee had been up and running for two years. In that space of time, we completed all of the above steps. Roisin, who works for An Taisce, came to visit our school and assessed our committee. We gave her a tour of the school and showed her all of our work. She was particularly impressed with our banners and our separate bins on each corridor. After the Easter holidays, we received the greatly anticipated news that our school had been awarded our very first Green Flag. We were then invited to the Helix in DCU for an award ceremony and a sit down lunch on Tuesday, 21st May. We are so delighted to have been awarded the flag.
