This year at scifest we had such amazing and creative entries and some talented winners!

Every year in our school we enter scifest, which is a science competition for TY students during their first science module. We are given a few weeks to work on our project in class and get to present them to judges in a series of rounds during the competition.

To start off the process we pick our groups and get thinking of some ideas to base our projects on. We plan our project, conduct some experiments and put it all together. The entries from this year spanned from physics and chemistry to biology and psychology. Some people even involved their grannies!

When the day came around we all presented our projects to four judges. Each round a judge would come by your table, examine your project, ask you a few questions and decide if you're through to the next round by placing a sticker on your project. Once you were judged by the judges you were submitted for a final judging where the judges have their last examination and decide on the winners for the different categories. The winning categories were physics, chemistry, biology, the environment, psychology and so many more. There was also a student choice award which was awarded to the group whose project was most popular according to the pupils. The winner of the student choice category was the creation of a colourblind app called bridging the colour gap.
