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## Students' Message



It was great to see students taking initiative as the Student Council hosted a bake sale to fundraise for free sanitary product machines in the bathrooms


As a parting word we would like to wish the best of luck to all sixth years who are doing their orals over the next few days.



Her speech focused on the importance of the female voice in international aid and at times of crisis. Well done, Aimee!

Dublin student wins national speech writing competition on theme of women in emergencies

A 15-year-old student from Our Lady's School Terenure, Dublin - who has been inspired by UN Women Goodwill Ambassador, award-winning actress Emma Watson- has been announced as the winner of a national speech writing competition aimed at raising awareness of global issues that impact and discriminate against women and girls globally.

Aimee Dignam won the ActionTalks competition, run by ActionAid Ireland with funding from Irish Aid, with a powerful speech on the role of women's leadership during emergencies, conflict and climate disasters.

Aimee revealed she has been inspired by award-winning actress and humanitarian, Emma Watson and her work advocating for gender equality and empowering young women. A speech Watson gave on equality at the UN has been a huge influence on Aimee. The actress played a key role in launching the HeForShe campaign, which aims to mobilise men and boys as advocates for gender equality.

Said Aimee: "Emma Watson made an incredible speech on gender equality, and I loved listening to that speech. It has been really empowering, and I have used it in my life."

Drawing on powerful examples from the Philippines and Nepal, Aimee explained how women serve as effective community organisers and resourceful problem solvers during crisis recovery.

Aimee referenced research demonstrating that countries with higher female leadership experience lower disaster-related mortality rates, while highlighting that women continue to face significant barriers to decision-making positions. She called for greater recognition and support of women's leadership in disaster response and planning.

Reflecting on her chosen topic, Aimee shared: "When I saw this topic, I knew it was something I wanted to do because I know it's a really serious topic and it's been around for way too long. It's something I'm passionate about and I think deserves to be spoken up about."

She added: "Young people are the upcoming voices for the world. I would say to them, if not you, then who? It is really important that we are able to step up to become the future leaders and make a change."

ActionAid Ireland, which runs the competition annually, received 90 entries from 23 schools across 12 counties. As the first-place winner, Aimee received a €500 voucher, and her teacher, Gemma Hayes, received a €100 voucher.

This year's competition invited students to write speeches on compelling global themes, including: the leadership role of women during emergencies, conflict and climate disasters, the impact of climate change on women's rights and overseas aid and women's rights organisations.

Karol Balfe, ActionAid Ireland CEO said: "It was heartening to see so many students across the country take part in the competition this year and share their views on global issues so articulately and with such passion. The high standard and obvious passion made it very difficult to judge at every stage of the competition. Aimee clearly researched the topic of women in emergencies at length, she developed strong arguments and then delivered the speech confidently. We are delighted to announce Aimee as the winner of ActionTalks and she should be very proud."

The finals were held at Europe House in Dublin, the official venue of the European Commission Representation in Ireland. The distinguished panel of judges included Carl O'Brien, Education Editor of The Irish Times; Sara Hakim, School of Sanctuary Director; and Maria Riordan, Education Officer at Irish Aid, Department of Foreign Affairs.

This competition is supported by Irish Aid (Department of Foreign Affairs), which funds ActionAid's Women's Rights Programme, a programme that works to eliminate violence against women and girls. Irish Aid programmes are funded by Irish citizens and play an important global role in supporting women and girls.






## Musical










Charlie Murphy, 6th Year. Charlie has excelled in her GAA career, which began, like most girls, in her local club's academy at the age of six, playing both Football and Camogie. From the academy, she progressed to Go Games until U12, and then onto League and Championship from U13. Her talent was noticed early in both codes, where she played up a year alongside her sister Ruby, winning many league and championship titles up to the age of U16. At U16, she was called to trial for Dublin Football and Camogie, where she was selected for both codes, eventually winning Leinster titles in both. At U17, she was again picked for both Dublin squads but had to make a decision on which to choose. She opted for Football, where she was made vice-captain for the Dublin Minors, winning the Leinster B Championship and exiting at the semi-final stage. Following this, she again made the Dublin Minor Football team and had the privilege of being asked to captain the team.

**Éile Caffrey,** 5th Year - While Éile is also a dual-code player, her passion is Camogie. Her love of and skills in both Camogie and football were developed in St Judes where she followed her older sister Iseult (also a past OLS pupil) from a very young age. She currently captains the Dublin Minor Camogie Team. 2024 brought her All Ireland medal success as part of the Dublin Minor Camogie Team beating Wexford in a replay. She is also part of the OLS Camogie Team who has made it to the All Ireland quarter finals in the last two years and to the semi final this year.




### About the inductees

Ellen Walshe has an extraordinary record of success on the international stage of swimming. She was only 19 on her Olympic debut in Tokyo in 2021 where she was 19th in the 200m Individual Medley and 24th in the 100m butterfly. She won a phenomenal silver medal at the World Championships in 2021 in the 400m IM. Ellen was the first Irish swimmer to qualify for the Paris Olympics in 2024 where she qualified for the 400IM Final, only the third Irish Swimmer ever to do so. She was also a Semi Finalist in the 200IM, and a member of the Women's Irish Record breaking Medley Relay Team, which finished 11th overall. Ellen currently holds 10 Junior and Senior Irish records in different distances and events and we are so proud of her achievements.








Students participated in a Zumba class with Luiza in the Sport Hall. It was a great opportunity for the students to move, dance, and laugh.



TYs had a wonderful opportunity to take part in Dreamspace at Microsoft. They got a chance to see different careers that take place in Microsoft. It was a great afternoon.


















On the 15th February, 48 students accompanied by six teachers set off skiing in Bormio, Italy.

They were a wonderful positive group and all interacted well with each other. Staff commented how each day they sat in different seats for breakfast and dinner in order to chat to lots of people.



The first year in the **Accelerated Reader program** had a competition on writing book recommendations. Big congratulations to all! You read more than 37 000 000 words until now!
































We have had a lovely time in drama this year with students partaking in Drama Exams with the Royal Irish Academy and a Feis Competition.


